Bishop Lee issues letter on swine flu outbreak

Bishop Jeffrey Lee has issued a letter to clergy and congregations on the recent swine flu outbreak, calling for members to be "calmly attentive to our own health and the health of our communities." With the ease of viral transmissions through air travel and global commerce, "responsible behavior becomes an ethical mandate as well as good stewardship of our bodies and lives," he said. So far the virus has appeared in 41 states, infecting nearly 900 people, and causing one death. The largest outbreak is in Mexico which has 1,100 cases, and experienced 42 deaths.

Along with practicing basic preventive practices, we must also keep all those affected by the flu outbreak in our regular Prayers of the People on Sundays, and be careful how we refer to people who are affected. A good resource, he said, is Enriching Our Worship 2 which has formats for public services of healing and pastoral visits. He also recommended the Congregational Resources page on the diocesan website for additional resources.

Leading change through selfdifferentiation

The Lombard Mennonite Peace Center is offering our Here I Stand: Leading Change Through Self-Differentiation on **August 18-20**, 2009, at Church of the Redeemer Lutheran Church, 139 E. First St., Hinsdale, Illinois. The training seminar begins Tuesday August 18 at 1:30 pm, and ends Thursday, August 20

at 12:30 pm. It is designed for clergy, Christian formation directors, clinical pastoral education directors, spiritual directors, and members of commissions or committees on ministry. The goal is to develop facilitators for groups using the Here I Stand program.

Church leaders have learned that short-term solutions and quick-fixes do little to address the multi-generational patterns which characterize the functioning of congregations and other church organizations.

In the Here I Stand process, participants - with the help of a facilitator trained at this event - develop and reflect on their own "Beliefs Chart." Using this chart, facilitators invite greater clarity of beliefs among church members or others as they observe and think about the influence of relationship pressures on the shaping of their beliefs and principles over the years.

To prepare for the seminar, participants are required to read Extraordinary Relationships: A New Way of Thinking About Human Interactions by Dr. Roberta Gilbert.
