Council and forums to begin charting mission strategies and opportunities

At the January 10 Diocesan Council meeting, Bishop Jeffrey Lee briefed council members on the initial steps for charting the strategies for a total common ministry vision along the lines of the framework he offered at Diocesan Convention: Grow the Church, Form the Faithful, Change the World. "We are building on the groundwork that is already being laid," he said, referring to the responses coming out of the Convention table discussions to his address. The task now, is to identify challenges and opportunities, and prioritize how we respond to them. Council should have a leading role in the process, he said, of choosing priorities. He emphasized this visioning process will continue to involve the full diocesan community through regional and diocesan wide forums, and feedback on corporate foundations dedicated to controlling the plan as it takes shape.

The challenges he identified include congregational debt, declining congregations that still have great spiritual vitality, changing demographics and economics, changing communications patterns, internalized racism, clericalism, and undeployed assets.

Heading the opportunity column is the shift to total common ministry, a way of being church that embraces the ministry of all the baptized, and which has become the ministry template for several smaller, more rural dioceses, including Northern Michigan, Nevada, and Alaska. A Total Common Ministry task force, chaired by the Rev. Charlie DeKay, rector of Trinity Church, Aurora, has been formed, and a delegation will be learning more about integrating total ministry in congregational life at the Living Stones Partnership conference in Des Moines February 7 through 10. Donations still welcome for One to One Malaria Net Challenge

The One to One Malaria Net Challenge launched at Diocesan Convention by the deacons community is generating thousands of donations towards the goal of funding enough nets to represent all 40,000 members of our diocese. Nets cost \$12 each and last five years. Your donations may be sent to the point person in your congregation for the One to One Challenge, or directly to Episcopal Relief and Development. For information on your local point person or on the NetsforLife program contact Deacon Liz Meade, coordinator for the One to One Challenge, at galameade@aol.com NetsforLife is a partnership of Episcopal Relief and Development, ecumenical agencies, and and preventing malaria in sub-Saharan Africa. This three-year program, currently active in eight countries, is working with local Anglican churches and ecumenical organizations in 15 countries, expanding to 18 countries by 2009. Presently malaria kills 1 million people a year, 75 percent of whom are children under five years of age. A \$12 donation purchases an insecticide treated net that can protect a family. So far NetsforLife has distributed nearly 800,000 nets and affected about 9.8 million people directly and indirectly through education programs.

Presiding Bishop calls for intervention to end attacks in Sudan by Lord's Resistance Army

Presiding Bishop Katharine Jefferts Schori has issued a statement on the attacks by the "Lord's Resistance Army" in the Sudan, calling on Episcopalians to learn more about the LRA's campaign of terror through the Episcopal Life Online article, and the Episcopal Church of Sudan website. She also urged church members to support Episcopal Relief and Development's relief work in Sudan, and to use the new White House website to urge the President to work with the international community and the United Nations to apprehend LRA leaders, and start negotiations for a peacekeeping force in the region which includes southern Sudan, Uganda, Rwanda and the Congo.

"It is with great sorrow that I have received, in recent days, reports from brother bishops and other Episcopalians in the Sudan of the latest round of humanitarian atrocities committed by the so-called Lord's Resistance Army (LRA)," she wrote. "Since the beginning of this year, several parishes and villages in the Dioceses of Mundri and Ezo have fallen victim to LRA attacks that have included killings, child abductions, executions by decapitation and other unspeakable crimes. Tragically, the violence appears only to be spreading, with reports now coming that LRA activity has spread across southern Sudan to Torit, Kajokeji, Lainya, Yei, Yambio, Ibba, Maridi, and Lui. . . .

"An Episcopal group from the United States, led by Bishops Frank Gray and David Jones and also including representatives of the Diocese Chicago, will be traveling through the Sudan beginning next week and will be meeting with the Sudanese House of Bishops. I have asked Bishops Gray and Jones to brief my staff and me upon their return so that we may best tailor an advocacy response." Read the full statement. Note: Phil Darrow of St. Michael's, Barrington will be representing the Diocese of Chicago on the fact-finding trip.

Participation is open to high school age youth and the adults who work with them. Travel will be by Amtrak from Chicago to New Orleans, and then by rented vans to Bay St. Louis. The cost is still uncertain, as it will depend on fundraising efforts this spring. The base cost is expected to be about \$500 per person, and the cost for youth under \$200. A non-refundable deposit must be made by March 15 to reserve a space on the mission team. After March 15 the non-refundable deposit increases to \$200. No reservations may be made after May 28. Participants must attend at least two of the preparation meetings, and have taken the Keeping God's People Safe training. The training will be offered at one of the preparation meetings. Rogers was appointed dean with the endorsement of the Cathedral Chapter January 13, and assumed office January 18. She had served as provost of the cathedral since May 2007. In a letter to the Cathedral congregation Bishop Lee said "I hope that the entire Cathedral community will join me in giving thanks to God for this call. I commit myself together with you and your new Dean to the mission and ministry God has given us."

Brent House students to attend United Nations Commission on Status of Women

Two young women at the University of Chicago and active in the Brent House Episcopal Campus Ministry are among nine women, ages 19 to 26, chosen to participate in the United Nations Commission on the Status of Women session in New York City February 27 to March 6. Laura Eberly, an undergraduate student at the University of Chicago; and Kate Lemler, a student at the University of Chicago Medical School, will attend the 53rd session of the UNCSW which will focus on the equal sharing of responsibilities between women and men, including care giving in the context of HIV/AIDS. The delegation is being sponsored by the Women's and Young Adult Leadership office in the Episcopal Church's Mission Leadership Center.

Said the Rev. Stacy Alan, chaplain for Brent House: "In my ministry with some of the brightest young adults in our country, I am struck not just by their intelligence, but by their passion to contribute something positive to the world. At the same time, they are not naïve about the challenges we face. This is, after all, the generation that came of age on 9/11 and has always known about global warming. To involve these young women at a level that engages both the church and the political realm seems to me to be a marvelous way to connect them with structures through which they can channel their passion for justice."

UBE sponsors Annual Celebration of Absalom Jones

The Chicago Chapter of the Union of Black Episcopalians is sponsoring the 26th annual celebration of Absalom Jones, the first African American priest in the Episcopal Church, the weekend of February 7 and 8. The theme for the weekend will be "Speaking Truth to Each Other". Dr. Gerri Outlaw will be the keynote speaker for Saturday's event, **February 7**, at St. Margaret's of Scotland, located at 2555 E. 73rd Street from 1-4 p.m. She will speak Oppressions," and will invite audience response afterwards.

The Rev. Jeremiah Wright, rector emeritus of Trinity United Church of Christ, Chicago and noted author and speaker on the black church experience, is the keynote speaker at the observance on Sunday, February 8 at 3 pm at St. Thomas parish, the mother church of black Episcopalians in the Diocese of Chicago. The February 8 observance will feature hymns and anthems from several choirs, and remarks by UBE Midwest Regional Director Patricia Abrams.

New procedures for Sudan donations

Jackie Kraus, chair of the Renk subcommittee of the Commission on Global Ministry, has advised the diocesan treasurer's office that the procedures for making donations to the Chicago's companion diocese of Renk, Sudan have changed due to a federal government move. The US Treasury Dept. has called for renewal of Office of Foreign Assets Control (OFAC) registrations, canceling the OFAC registration of Renk Diocese, said Kraus. The Diocese of Virginia applied for, and was granted, OFAC registration status for the purpose of continuing wire transfer of funds to the Episcopal Church of Sudan and its 24d dioceses. From now until further notice, she said, the process for transfer of funds to Renk will go via St. Michael's, Barrington, and from there on to the treasurer's office of the Diocese of Virginia.

Bishop appoints diocesan ERD coordinator

Bishop Jeffrey Lee has appointed **Deacon Michael Bond** as the new Episcopal Relief & Development diocesan coordinator. Bond is the production manager at the Episcopal Church Center in Chicago and will continue in that post. In his new capacity of diocesan coordinator for Episcopal Relief & Development, Bond is currently focused on establishing four area coordinators within the diocese as

both elementary and high school will receive a saving bond from UBE.

The observance honors the work of the first African American priest in the Episcopal Church, Absalom Jones, who was ordained priest in 1804. Jones, with Richard Allen, was among the first leaders of the African American community to lobby for the abolition of slavery. They formed the Free African Society in 1787 after being expelled from St. George's Methodist Church in Philadelphia after refusing to sit in the slave gallery. Later Jones and Allen organized nursing and burial efforts during a two-year yellow fever epidemic in Philadelphia, a ministry that won them praise throughout New England, While Allen chose to remain in the Methodist Church—forming the first black church in the United States—Jones chose to join the Episcopal Church, and founded St. Thomas African Episcopal Church in 1794.
