Momentum:

Conversations on Emergent Faith will bring together noted speakers and leaders in emergent church and church development on **Monday, April 19**, 9 am to 4 pm, at St. Michael's Episcopal Church in Barrington, Illinois.

Renowned author, speaker, pastor, and networker among innovative Christian leaders, Brian McLaren will lead a dynamic discussion on the emergent church movement and more importantly begin to explore with us how our parishes and our Dioceses can participate in the development and growth of these communities.

Together with Brian, we will hear Tom Brackett, Program Officer for church planting and redevelopment for The Episcopal Church. He will inform us of what is taking place around our denomination in response to the belief that this is the Episcopal Moment: an opportunity for us to reach out with the beauty of our spiritual

The future of the Episcopal Diocese of Haiti may well look very much like its past in one very important aspect: its service to the people of that impoverished nation. "We have been here before, we are here now and we will be there after," said the Rev. Canon Oge Beauvoir, a Haitian native and one of four Episcopal Church missionaries assigned to work with the diocese in the impoverished country, who spoke to ENS Jan. 27 via telephone from the Haitian capital of Port-au-Prince.

The Episcopal Church of Haiti, known locally as L'Eglise Episcopale d'Haiti, will mark its 150th anniversary in 2011. Haitian Episcopalians have preached and practiced a "gospel of wholeness" since its founding in 1861, according to Bishop Jean Zaché Duracin.

A second missionary, the Rev. Lauren Stanley, echoed Beauvoir's promise.

"For 149 years the diocese has taken the lead in caring for the people of Haiti through our schools, through our medical clinics, our feeding programs, our water programs, through our churches, through the music program, through taking care of abandoned handicapped children," she told ENS. "Everything we have done for 149 years we will do for another 149 years."

Stanley said that the diocese is committed to all of the people of Haiti, "not just Episcopalians in our pews," adding that it will rebuild its schools, hospitals and churches and "will continue to care for the people that nobody else cares about because that's what we have always done." ## **Episcopal Service Corps affiliates with the Diocese of Chicago**

Diocesan Council and Bishop and Trustees have recognized Episcopal Service Corps as an affiliated agency of the diocese. The church-wide organization, which has moved its office to Chicago, coordinates a network of service programs in U.S. communities that deploy young adults for one year of service. Goals are to work for social justice, deepen spiritual awareness and discern vocation, develop leadership skills in the paradigm of servant leadership, and to live a simple, sustainable lifestyle. The 12 programs include the newest: The Julian Year project of Episcopal Charities and Community Services and the Diocese of Chicago, which will begin operations later this year, likely based at St. Martin's, Chicago. # Anglican Communion project to look at how Anglicans read the Bible

The Bible in the Life of the Church' is a major project being undertaken over three years by the Anglican Communion, mandated by the Anglican Consultative Council at its Jamaica meeting in May 2009. It is seeking to discover how Anglican Christians read the Bible, recognizing the very diverse contexts we inevitably bring to this reading. With the support of the Anglican Communion Department of Theological Studies, the work of this Bible project will largely take place in a number of Regional Groups based around theological education institutions in Kenya, Southern Africa, South East Asia, Oceania, North America and Britain. Representatives of each of these regions were present at the opening Steering Group meeting in London and together set up the process that the Regional Groups will seek to follow throughout the coming year.

The steering group is also planning to set up a number of "User Groups" that will enable input from other parts of the Anglican Communion. Serving on the Steering Group will be members from Latin America and Nigeria. The "User Groups" will take part in the project by testing out material that emerges from the work of the Steering and Regional Groups.

### Accessibility grants available

The Retirement Research Foundation is receiving applications for its Accessible Faith Grant Program which funds accessibility projects for Chicago area houses of faith. Churches, temples and mosques in Cook, Lake, and DuPage Counties are eligible to apply for the grants. The grants cover up to 50 percent of a project's cost for a maximum of \$30,000. Eligible projects for grants include the design and construction of accessibility improvements such as elevators, lifts, permanent ramps, and restroom renovations to bring them into compliance with the American Disability Act. Program related equipment such as assistive listening systems are also permissible. The grant program will be administered in two phases for 2010. First phase deadline is April 16, and the deadline for the second phase is **June 25**. Notification of awards will be made roughly five months after each deadline. For more
