Easter Message from Bishop Lee

Dear Friends,

"There is so much good news out there!" That was a spontaneous outburst from one of the participants in a gathering last month of clergy who are in new positions or new to the diocese. It came in response to a question I asked about what the priorities should be for our work together as a new bishop and leaders in the Diocese of Chicago. This was one person's answer to that question: "There is so much good news out there ... in our churches and in the communities we serve. We need to hear about it and celebrate it."

I agree. As I have begun traveling around the diocese I am struck by just how much good news is being made real in the lives of individuals and congregations and agencies of our church. From parish food pantries and feeding ministries to the dedication of a new, multi-million dollar residential facility for at-risk youth at Lawrence Hall. From the heroic response of chaplains and congregations to horror on the NIU campus to the joyful celebration of the latest youth gathering at Happening. From quiet acts of prayer in a hospital room to public advocacy for the passage of just hunger legislation. From the introduction of a child to the story of the Good Shepherd to our ongoing organizational struggle to address the sin of racisim. In large ways and small the Episcopal Church in Northern Illinois is announcing the Good News that Jesus brought: the Kingdom of God, the Reign of God is in our midst.

The author Brian McLaren says that for too much of Christian history the good news of Jesus has become the good news about Jesus. And he says the good news of Jesus is just this: God has chosen to enter into partnership with humankind to save this world from self-destruction. In Jesus God has entered the human condition to save it, to save us from our selfishness and greed, from our murderous mistrust and hatred of one another. The great and mighty good news of Easter is that not even death could stop that project. God will not fail.

Given its obvious shortcomings and even sinfulness we should not need to be reminded that the Church is not the same thing as the Kingdom of God. But the Church is a sacrament, a living sign of Christ himself and it serves as an effective sacramental sign when it is working to make God's Kingdom, God's Reign of justice and peace and love a visible reality. My heart sings when I look around this Diocese and see many, many signs of how that is happening here. It is happening in the Diocese of Chicago and, by God's grace it is happening all over the Episcopal Church. The most striking thing about attending my first meeting of the House of Bishops was to note how many stories there were about the Good News of God's Reign from all over the country. I believe the overwhelming majority of the bishops of our church want to focus there and not on the issues that divide us. This world is dying to see an example of what it could mean to walk together in love without needing to agree on everything. That in itself would be a powerful sign of the Kingdom. I believe God wants this church to be such a sign.

So in this Easter season I invite you to look for signs of the Kingdom of God. They are all around you. Look for ways you can join with members of your church, with friends in your community to make the love of God real for someone else. Tell the Good News. The resurrection of Jesus Christ sets us free to act in ways that can transform the world. We will find challenges. We may be misunderstood or opposed or worse. But there is nothing to fear. Christ has overcome the world and God's Reign is very near.

Alleluia! Christ is risen!

Youth Pilgrimage to St. James Cathedral to view the Keiskamma Altarpiece

The Bishop of Chicago and the people of St. James invite the youth of our diocese to make a pilgrimage to the Cathedral on **Saturday March 29** to welcome the return of the Keiskamma Altarpiece to Chicago. The Altarpiece will be on display through Eastertide, the last installation before its return to South Africa. The day begins with registration at 9:30 am, followed by the program starting at 10 am. The day ends with a closing worship at 4 pm. Transportation from Metra stations to the cathedral will be

The Altarpiece was created by women of Hamburg, South Africa as a hope filled response to the tragedy of AIDS in their community. Kennon Callahan returns for church development conference

Church development expert Kennon Callahan will lead his second conference for the Diocese of Chicago on **April 7**, **8** and **9** at St. Michael's, Barrington. In Leadership Resources for a Missional Church, Callahan will teach participants how to grow generous congregations, ones which focus on bringing ministry and mission to the real hurts, hopes, and needs of the community. His advice centers on twelve characteristics of effective congregations; six Relational and six Functional.

The sessions run from 1:30-5:00 and 7:00-8:30 pm each day. The 7:00-8:30 pm session is intended for those members of clergy and vestry that cannot attend the earlier session though participants can attend both sessions if they so desire.

Bishop Scantlebury to visit Sudan

Assistant Bishop Victor Scantlebury will be representing Presiding Bishop Katharine Jefforts Schori on a fact-finding mission to Sudan April 16 through 26. The group will be gathering information on the stalled peace accord between the government of Sudan and the Sudan People's Liberation Movement; and attending the enthronement of the Episcopal Church of Sudan's new primate, Archbishop Daniel Deng Bul, on April 21 in Juba. Archbishop Deng, who has served as bishop of Chicago's companion diocese of Renk since 1988. He succeeds The Most Rev. Joseph Marona who retired the end of December.

Episcopal Peace Fellowship plans memorial at St. James Cathedral

The Episcopal Peace Fellowship will be erecting a memorial inside St. James Cathedral to commemorate the deaths of over 3,900 U.S. military personnel in Iraq, and the more than 600,000 Iraqi military members and civilians who have also lost their lives in the five years of this conflict. When the count of U.S. armed forces deaths reaches 4,000, the Fellowship will organize a memorial service that day at the cathedral.

A statement on the EPF website reads:

We will be there to mourn the human cost of war, call for the troops to come home and support funding of an Iraqi-led reconstruction in their war-torn country. Each year that the occupation of Iraq continues, grim new milestones that are reminders of the human cost of war will be recorded.

Our display honors every U.S. serviceperson and all Iraqis who have died in Iraq. In a meditative act of remembrance, volunteers from all over Chicago helped to assemble the memorial by hand writing the name, rank, age, and hometown of each casualty.

Estimates of the Iraqi death toll vary widely, but a recent study put the figure at more than 600,000 Iraqis killed,¹ while other estimates put the number over one million. The field of white in our display symbolizes both the innumerable Iraqi casualties, and our hopes for peace for the Iraqi people.

This display is a testament to our commitment to change course in Iraq. We believe not one more Iraqi or U.S. soldier should be killed; not one more U.S. dollar should be spent sustaining war and occupation.

Has your congregation submitted its pledge to the treasurer's office?

As of March 14, the Office of the Treasurer had received pledges to the 2008 diocesan budget from 82 congregations, about two-thirds of the 121 parishes and missions in the Diocese of Chicago. The total pledged stands at just over \$2.1 million. Income from congregational pledges for the 2008 budget is set at \$3,131,740. Of the 82 congregations pledging, two dozen have pledged at or above their Common Mission Share. The parish with the biggest increase is Trinity Church, Aurora which upped its pledge by 131 percent. The largest pledge to date is \$243,832; the smallest is \$500. There are still 40 congregations that have not turned in pledges. Under the voluntary giving guidelines adopted by Diocesan Convention, congregations are encouraged to give from 11 percent to 15 percent of their operating income as defined under Report of Revenues and Expenses for 2007 on page 3 of the annual parochial report. The prescribed levels are determined by the congregations' income range: for income below \$100,000, the CMS is 11 percent; for income ranging \$100,000 to \$200,000 the CMS is 13 percent; and for income over \$200,000 the CMS is 15 percent. Panel discussions on Keiskamma Altarpiece

St. James Cathedral, well known in Chicago as a venue for the presentation of high quality music and art, will host Community Concerns in the Arts, a four part series of panel discussions that will explore socially conscious artistic practice in Chicago. The free public programs will bring together panelists from the city's arts organizations for this series of lively discussions, with Q&A following.

The series will use the **Keiskamma Altarpiece**—on view **March 27 through May 11** at St. James Cathedral following a U.S. tour—as a starting point for the first presentation, and a backdrop for the next three discussions. The altarpiece is a truly remarkable work of community art created by 130 people, predominantly women, in rural, poverty-stricken, AIDS-affected Hamburg, South Africa. It is a masterful and massive (14 x 22 feet) work done in embroidery, appliqué, beadwork, and photography on three layers of wood panels, combining stories of the loss of community members with a message of hope for the future. The work provided solace in the face of suffering and grief, and much-needed income, for the artists.

All programs in the series are at **6:00 p.m. to 8:00 p.m.** at St. James Cathedral, corner of Wabash Ave. and Huron Street, and are free to the public. Doors will open at 5:30 p.m.

The series is organized by Nathan Mason, Curator of Special Projects, Public Art Program, Visual Arts Division, Chicago Department of Cultural Affairs.

Community Concerns in the Arts is co-presented by the Chicago Department of Cultural Affairs, the Hamburg Committee of the Chicago Sister Cities International Program, Chicago Artists Resource (www.chicagoartistsresource.org) and St. James Cathedral.

April 1: "Introducing and contextualizing the Keiskamma Altarpiece." The first panel will feature Eunice Mangwane, a healthcare worker and AIDS educator, and Noseti Makhubalo, the lead artist for the altarpiece. Both are Xhosa women from Hamburg intimately involved in the work of the Keiskamma Trust. Hear their stories of how a disheartened community came together to create a work of hope and a message to the world, and at the same time, a means of financial support in a poverty-stricken village.

April 8: "Individual Practice." Bernard Williams, Preston Jackson and Marva Jolly. Three wellestablished Chicago artists will discuss their artwork and how it addresses social issues and community concerns.

April 22: "Community Practice." Chicago is home to a long tradition of community-based art. archi-treasures, the Chicago Public Art Group, and Marwen are three important organizations currently involved in the practice and promulgation of community-based art. Joyce Fernandes, archi-treasures; Jon Pounds, the Chicago Public Art Group, and Scott Lundias, Marwen, are the panelists.

April 29: "Presenters and Funders." How presenters and funders of the Visual Arts address social issues and community concerns through the arts while also promoting and nurturing artists is the topic of the final panel. Panelists include Chuck Thurow, Hyde Park Art Center; Faheem Majeed, South Side Community Art Center; Riva Lehrer, Access Living; Michelle Boone, Joyce Foundation, and Encarnacion Teruel, Illinois Arts Council.

The Keiskamma Altarpiece is owned and exhibited by the Keiskamma Trust, which includes the Keiskamma Arts Project, the Keiskamma Health Project, and the Umtha Welanga HIV/AIDS Treatment Center in Hamburg, South Africa.

Gulf Coast mission trip planned for August 2008

The Office of Youth and Young Adult Ministry has organized a second Gulf Coast mission trip this coming August for high school and college age youth and the adults who work with them. The week long mission, **August 2 through 9** will be based at two of the Katrina work camps: Mission on the Bay in Bay St. Louis, Miss., and Camp Coast Care at Long Beach, Miss. High school and college youth teams will be based at Mission on the Bay while adults not working with the youth will be based at Camp Coast Care. Both teams have a limit of 50 persons. Cost has not been set. The organizers hope to keep the youth costs to \$200 or less per student through fundraising efforts and diocesan subsidies. Travel will be by Amtrak from Chicago to New Orleans and then in rented vans to the Mississippi Gulf Coast. The Diocese of Chicago's 2008 Mission Trip is a ministry to the people whose lives were affected by Hurricane Katrina in Bay St. Louis, Long Beach, Pearlington, and other areas in Mississippi. Volunteers participating in the activities of the mission trip will be expected to be involved in specific repair and building activities including, but not limited to: gutting houses, cleaning debris, gardening, yard work, roofing, carpentry, dry walling, digging and building steps, plumbing, glasswork, insulating, painting, flooring, masonry, electrical wiring and other facets of repair, remodeling and renovation. These activities include, but are not limited to: the use of power tools such as saws and drills, as well as the use of hand tools. The foregoing activities will also require climbing with and without supplies, tools and materials as well as working in high places such as on roofs and other facets of construction work.

Volunteers may, in their free time, engage in non-sponsored activities including, swimming, or other sports activities of their choosing. Planned evening activities may include, but are not limited to: visiting the local community, traveling to visit places or people of regional interest.
