Seabury-Western board charts course for radical restructuring

Seabury-Western Theological Seminary will be charting a new course for theological education as it responds to the economic challenges facing Episcopal seminaries and the changing circumstances of congregationally based ordained ministry.

In a February 20 letter to Episcopal bishops with seminarians enrolled at Seabury-Western in Evanston, II., seminary dean the Very Rev. Gary Hall said the executive committee of the seminary's board had approved a planning committee's recommendations to end the three-year residential Master of Divinity program, and suspend recruitment and admissions to all of the seminary's degree and certificate programs. The seminary's popular Doctor of Ministry program in congregational development, administered through Seabury Institute, will continue with the present enrollment through the completion of degrees, but will not accept new students for the time being.

The Executive Committee, stressed Dean Hall, does not intend to eliminate the Master of Divinity program, only the three-year residential model currently in use. The possibility of offering the Master of Divinity in other formats will be explored over the next two months leading up to a special meeting of the seminary board of trustees in late April, said Hall.

"The seminary is not closing its doors. It is engaging in a radical reassessment of what shape its mission has to take in this time," said Bishop Jeffrey Lee of Chicago.

Bishop Lee, who attended his first board meeting as a Seabury-Western trustee February 15, said he would be working with Chicago's Commission on Ordained Ministry, people in the discernment process in Chicago, and other Episcopal seminaries to envision "how we best form people and then deploy them most effectively for the church's life as it exists right now, right here in the Diocese of Chicago."

Bishop Lee said he has offered Dean Hall and Seabury's faculty and students "all the resources at my disposal for pastoral care in this time of transition." Read more on the <u>diocesan web news section</u>.

Diocese and Seabury-Western collaborate on clergy mentoring

The Diocese of Chicago and Seabury-Western Theological Seminary have initiated a collaborative program that will lead to certification in congregational development for seminarians studying for Master of Divinity degrees. The new program will be an extension of the Making Excellent Disciples clergy mentoring program operated by the diocese's Office of Ministry Development. In operation since 2002, the Making Excellent Disciples (MED) program places newly ordained clergy in mentoring congregations for two years, after which they move on to serve as rectors and vicars of "mustard seed" congregations, ones that average fewer than 150 in average Sunday attendance but are poised for growth. The MED program currently has ten MED curates. The new program will place seminarians in both mentoring congregations and mustard seed congregations for two years. Participating seminarians must fulfill all field education requirements of Seabury-Western and spend an additional five to ten hours a week in ministry in the congregation. The seminarians will be required to take two congregational development courses in addition to the basic seminary curriculum during the two years they are participating in the program. Each seminarian selected for the program will receive a \$2,000 annual stipend, and each mentoring congregation will receive a \$2,000 grant. Seminarians participating in the program will be appointed by the bishop of Chicago and the dean of Seabury-Western. For further information contact the Rev. Bishop Daniel Deng Bul elected Archbishop of Church of Sudan

The Episcopal Church of Sudan has elected Bishop Daniel Deng Bul, bishop of the Diocese of Renk, as archbishop of the province. The election took place February 14 at a three day emergency General Synod at All Saints Cathedral in Juba, Sudan .

"It is a big day filled with excitement in Juba," said Emmanuel Sserwadda, the Episcopal Church's partnership officer for Africa who is attending the February 13-15 Synod.

The 75 voting delegates included bishops, clergy and laity, and a two-thirds majority of 50 votes was required to elect the new archbishop. The other candidates were Bishop Ezekiel Kondo of Khartoum and Bishop Francis Loyo of Rokoni.

Deng received 39 votes, Loyo 21 and Kondo 15. Kondo was eliminated and before the Synod could proceed to the second ballot, Loyo withdrew and asked all delegates to support Deng. Deng's enthronement will be held at All Saints Cathedral in Juba on April 20. He succeeds the Most Rev. Joseph Marona who served eight years as archbishop until retiring last December. Since Marona's

retirement the dean of the cathedral in Khartoum, The Very Rev. Nathaniel Garang has served as interim archbishop. The Church of Sudan has 5 million members in 24 dioceses.

Gulf Coast mission trip planned for August 2008

The Office of Youth and Young Adult Ministry has organized a second Gulf Coast mission trip this coming August for high school and college age youth and the adults who work with them. The week long mission, **August 2 through 9** will be based at two of the Katrina work camps: Mission on the Bay in Bay St. Louis, Miss., and Camp Coast Care at Long Beach, Miss. High school and college youth teams will be based at Mission on the Bay while adults not working with the youth will be based at Camp Coast Care. Both teams have a limit of 50 persons. Cost has not been set. The organizers hope to keep the youth costs to \$200 or less per student through fundraising efforts and diocesan subsidies. Travel will be by Amtrak from Chicago to New Orleans and then in rented vans to the Mississippi Gulf Coast.

The Diocese of Chicago's 2008 Mission Trip is a ministry to the people whose lives were affected by Hurricane Katrina in Bay St. Louis, Long Beach, Pearlington, and other areas in Mississippi. Volunteers participating in the activities of the mission trip will be expected to be involved in specific repair and building activities including, but not limited to: gutting houses, cleaning debris, gardening, yard work, roofing, carpentry, dry walling, digging and building steps, plumbing, glasswork, insulating, painting, flooring, masonry, electrical wiring and other facets of repair, remodeling and renovation. These activities include, but are not limited to: the use of power tools such as saws and drills, as well as the use of hand tools. The foregoing activities will also require climbing with and without supplies, tools and materials as well as working in high places such as on roofs and other facets of construction work.

Volunteers may, in their free time, engage in non-sponsored activities including, swimming, or other sports activities of their choosing. Planned evening activities may include, but are not limited to: visiting the local community, traveling to visit places or people of regional interest.

Episcopal Church Archives offers online exhibit on African Americans

The Archives of the Episcopal Church announces an electronic publication and online exhibit entitled, *The Church Awakens: African Americans and the Struggle for Justice*. The multimedia exhibit, found at *http://episcopalarchives.org/Afro-Anglican_history/exhibit/*, covers the period of enslavement to the present, with emphasis on the Civil Rights era. As an educational resource for Church settings, the exhibit is designed to expand on the strength of reader input and future research.

This Web-based project offers an examination of the compelling story of how African American Episcopalians struggled to claim their rightful place as full and equal members of the Church community. The exhibit brings together a narrative overview of that development with photographs, documents, videos, and previously unheard taped interviews with prominent American figures on matters of race. Figures such as Absalom Jones, George Bragg, Pauli Murray, Jonathan Daniels, and Charles Lawrence are featured along with Church organizations such as the American Church Institute, the Conference of Church Workers, and the Episcopal Society for Cultural and Racial Unity. Audio recordings include interviews with figures as diverse as Langston Hughes and Jackie Robinson.

The exhibit arose from a 1993 commitment by the Board of the Archives of the Episcopal Church to focus the Archives= acquisitions and research services program on diversity, with an initial emphasis on the Afro-Anglican experience. The 1991 General Convention had called on the Church to conduct a wide-ranging examination of persistent institutional racism and patterns of forgetting that had overtaken the legacy of the post-Civil Rights period in Church and society. Working with a donor, the Reverend John Morris, who gave financial support to the exhibit, the Archives turned to emerging Web

technologies as a vehicle for making primary source materials permanently available to everyday Episcopalians and the public. The exhibit is a product of John Morris= desire to preserve a central lesson that the unified Christian community has within its grasp the capacity for extraordinary acts of justice and honor.
